# Introduction to the Screen Industry in Aotearoa NZ Micro-credential

#### Overview

This document provides guidance for providers intending to offer the Introduction to the Screen Industry in Aotearoa NZ micro-credential and the skills standards leading to this. It reflects industry expectations for the design and delivery of programmes leading to this micro-credential.

#### **Programme Entry**

It is important that learners are counselled to ensure suitability for the programme and nature of work in the screen industry. This may involve discussing career aspirations, and a learner's previous employment experience or interests. It is recommended that learners hold, or are working towards, a driver's licence.

#### **Structure**

It is recommended that Providers deliver the content of the skill standards in the following order to ensure fundamental information is taught first:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the operations and structure within the Aotearoa New Zealand screen industry.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the processes and ethics required in the Aotearoa New Zealand screen industry.
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the business skills required to operate as a contractor in Aotearoa New Zealand.

### **Delivery**

Delivery must include engagement with current industry practitioners such as guest speakers, site visits, field trips.

This may include:

- Visits and presentations from practising industry Heads of Department and the equipment they
  work with drawn from Art, Costume, 1<sup>st</sup> Assistant Director, Grip, Gaffer (Lighting), Data
  Imaging Technician, Makeup/prosthetics, Camera, 1<sup>st</sup> Assistant Editor, Sound (prod & post), VFX
  (visual effects production and post production), Production Accountant, Health and Safety.
- Presentations from practicing industry guests to discuss pathways to their position, their
  creative input into the production and visits to external equipment houses, onset production,
  film/tv studios and post facilities.
- Visits/presentations from tangata whenua industry practitioners
- Site visits e.g. departmental trucks, camera house, grip facility, lighting hire, post facility

• The opportunity for learners to experience real equipment used in the screen industry.

Skill standard:	Demonstrate knowledge of the business skills required to operate as a contractor in the Aotearoa New Zealand creative industries
Resources for delivery:	<ul> <li>IRD website forms and guidelines</li> <li>Examples of documentation relevant to industry e.g. timesheets, petty cash forms, invoices, non-disclosure agreements, release forms</li> <li>Examples of contracts: for the screen industry this may include US based international, local Guild based</li> <li>Screen Industry Workers Act, 2022</li> </ul>
Content to be covered:	<ul> <li>Contracts – international and domestic, memorandum/letter of understanding</li> <li>Negotiating contract conditions and remuneration</li> <li>Expenses – may include equipment hire, phone, vehicle, per diems, accommodation, utilities</li> <li>Non-Disclosure Agreements,</li> <li>Completing timesheets and writing invoices</li> <li>Obtaining receipts and making petty cash claims</li> <li>Record keeping, business expenses</li> <li>Business structures: sole trader, company, partnership</li> <li>Provisional tax, income tax, GST, withholding tax, ACC, filing returns</li> <li>Insurance - Public Liability, Health, Income Protection</li> <li>Budgeting for tax and contingency/quiet times</li> <li>Professional business practices – phone messages, online presence</li> <li>Staying up to date - Govt laws, business practice, NZ agencies, forums</li> <li>Kiwisaver</li> <li>Inland Revenue forms and help</li> <li>Financial implications of contracting</li> </ul>
