Introduction to the Screen Industry in Aotearoa NZ Micro-credential

Overview

This document provides guidance for providers intending to offer the Introduction to the Screen Industry in Aotearoa New Zealand micro-credential and the skills standards leading to this. It reflects industry expectations for the design and delivery of programmes leading to this micro-credential.

Programme Entry

It is important that learners are counselled to ensure suitability for the programme and nature of work in the screen industry. This may involve discussing career aspirations, and a learner's previous employment experience or interests. It is recommended that learners hold, or are working towards, a driver's licence.

Structure

It is recommended that providers deliver the content of the skill standards in the following order to ensure fundamental information is taught first:

- 1. Explore career roles and employment in the Aotearoa New Zealand screen industry.
- 2. Prepare for work in the Aotearoa New Zealand Screen industry.
- 3. Apply business financial skills to operate as a self-employed contractor in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Delivery

Delivery must include engagement with current industry practitioners such as guest speakers, site visits, field trips.

This may include:

- Visits and presentations from practising industry Heads of Department and the equipment they work with these may be drawn from Art, Costume, 1st Assistant Director, Grip, Gaffer (Lighting), Data Imaging Technician, Makeup/prosthetics, Camera, 1st Assistant Editor, Sound (prod & post), VFX (visual effects production and postproduction), Production Accountant, Health and Safety.
- Presentations from practicing industry guests to discuss pathways to their position, their creative input into the production and visits to external equipment houses, onset production, film/tv studios and post facilities.
- Visits/presentations from tangata whenua industry practitioners
- Site visits e.g. departmental trucks, camera house, grip facility, lighting hire, post facility
- The opportunity for learners to experience real equipment used in the screen industry.

Production types: Māori and pacific media: cinema, television drama, documentary, TV commercials, online, corporate, international and local, funded and non-funded. Key departments and roles within art, production, technical, logistics, post-production. Entry level positions in departments, and the skills required for these. What to include in a CV for the screen industry. Guilds, crew networking groups and booking agencies and apps, funding bodies, forums.
